On January 26, the first day of semester two, I will be starting the Automotive Service Technician Level 1 program at École Kelowna Secondary School (KSS). This school district program is taught by Red Seal Mechanic and teacher, Mr. Kendall Thomas. I have always been passionate about taking shop classes and during my time as a student at KSS, I've taken Metal Fabrication, Metal Art Jewelry and Automotive classes, as well as all the other courses to meet my graduation requirements.

As a grade 11 student, I enjoyed being in the Auto shop classroom and I always found it to be an interesting and positive place to work and learn. Seeing other students, including the Accelerated Credit Enrollment

in Industry Training (Ace-it) grade 12 students working on their cars, I decided that this was what I wanted to do in my grade 12 year. Mr. Thomas endorsed my decision to take the (Ace-it), now called the Youth Train in Trades program, because of my interest in working on vehicles and my enthusiasm for the other applied skills courses. The day I determined that this was my path, I went to the KSS Career Center and started the application process. It was an exciting challenge for me and I wanted to get all the requirements completed on-time. The application process included: a job shadow at Canadian Tire, completing the Industry Training Authority (ITA) Essential Skills test, and a written application.



My dream is to one day find employment at a "tuner" shop where I can work on import cars. I would love to work for "Hoonigan" where I could help build drift cars.

Being a female student entering into a mostly male-dominated trade might seem intimidating to some. However, I am currently the only female doing the Youth Train in Trades program this year, and never once have I felt intimidated by the guys. Everyone is incredibly friendly and supportive and I always feel right at home in the shop. For any girls who are considering going into the Youth Train in Trades program, or any other trade program, I strongly encourage you to go for it. I believe that you will not regret it!



expectations for work habits in other



involvement in creating unique learning opportunities - kindergarten to grade 12. Together, we provide a first class educational system with a plethora of choice for nearly 23,000 students.












WHY I CHOOSE...

My Blueprint PATTI BUNA Teacher - École Kelowna Secondary School



In 2015/2016, Central Okanagan Public Schools implemented the myBlueprint resource, an online career and education planner in our schools. MyBlueprint is a valuable resource for all students and parents to access information about personal assessments, educational and career pathways as well as post-secondary financial tools. This school year, most grades are being introduced to the resource if they didn't use it last year. Grade 11 students are using myBlueprint extensively in their Planning 10/ADC 11 class and grade 12 students are using it to revise their graduation requirement

post-secondary institution. The Trades Skills program can be taught in high school shop classes by Tech-Ed teachers





and involves introducing students to a variety of different trades. Currently, the Ministry of Education has released activity plans for electronics and robotics, metal, design/drafting, automotive, electrical, plumbing, and carpentry. The more indepth Youth Trades Sampler program is delivered to high school students through a partnership with a college. The District is offering a Trades Sampler program in partnership with Okanagan College (OC). This will provide students with a more indepth program sampling including skills in: carpentry, electrical, plumbing, sheet metal, and drafting. Students will also earn their grade 11 math requirement in a practical environment.

The third ITA Youth stream - "ITA Youth Train" is the former "ACE IT" Dual Credit program which involved grade 12 students TRAIN enrolling in a college trades foundation program. The Central Okanagan Public Schools partners with BCIT, OC, and the Electrical Industry Training Institute (EITI) to deliver

foundation trades programs to our

students. Students in the District have

access to a variety of trades foundation

plumbing/piping, welding, auto service technician, sheet metal, culinary, heavy mechanical trades, electrical, RV tech, utility arborist, and collision repair.

The last ITA Youth stream is "ITA Youth Work" and it involves the apprenticeship side of a career in the trades. Students can progress into work following their



foundation program or in some cases, students can go directly to employment and get on the job training

first, before going to college to attain their level 1 training. The work option enables students to earn a wage while being trained in their specific trade. Financial awards of \$1,000 are available to students who complete a determined amount of work hours during their high school tenure. Local employers are key to the implementation and success of the ITA Youth Work stream. The District is also searching for employers to mentor our students who have shown a willingness and readiness to enter the workforce in their chosen trade career. For students who are unsure about their career choice, please consider exploring the trades through one of the various options that are available in the District. All students are encouraged to discover and explore a career in the trades.



Industry Training Authority Youth Programs

In January 2017, the suite of Industry Training Authority (ITA) Youth Programs also referred to as Dual Credit Programs, is undergoing a major rebranding along with the addition of new options for students. The reason for the rebranding of the Youth Programs is to provide alignment between the program names and purpose with respect to careers in the trades.

Prior to the rebranding, the ITA Youth Programs were most noted for the Secondary School Apprenticeship and Trades Foundation Programs. These two programs were the hallmark of Dual Credit options for high school students in the District. Recently, BC's education system has shifted its Career Life Programs focus on careers, and more specifically in Trades and Technology to include students in our elementary schools. They have also increased the amount of opportunities for middle school students.

The new ITA Youth stream of programs

follows a logical progression from elementary students to high school students. The "ITA Youth Discover" stream has two options that enable students in the elementary and middle school grades to "discover" careers in trades and technology through activities such as field studies, hands-on trade related





trades activities, guest speakers from the industry, and much more. Educators are able to apply for funding from the ITA to help facilitate these and other activities that help the students in the younger years discover careers in trades and technology.

The next progressive stream for youth is the "ITA Youth Explore" which includes a Youth Trades Skills course and a more in-depth Youth Trades Sampler program which is delivered in partnership with a





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DUAL CREDIT PROGRAMS

New Trades Sampler Program for Grades 10-12

Central Okanagan Public Schools and Okanagan College have partnered together to deliver a trades investigation program to assist students in their career exploration while learning trades and technology skills. Students in grades 10-12 will have the opportunity to sample various trades programs. This learning experience embeds math and science while students discover and experience the in-demand trades that have been identified by the Industry Training Authority (Carpentry, Electrical, Plumbing, Sheet Metal, and Drafting).

The main outcome of the Trades Sampler Program is to provide students with an opportunity to explore several careers in the trades through relevant handson experiences while working towards their high school diploma. Students enrolled in the Trades Sampler Program will earn up to 20 credits for successful completion of the program.

New Education Assistant Certificate Program

George Elliot Secondary is pleased to be hosting a new Education Assistant Dual Credit program beginning in January 2017.

Working in a school setting, Education Assistants perform a variety of duties, including helping to implement Individualized Education Plans (IEPs) for children with exceptionalities in the areas of cognitive abilities, physical challenges, health issues, behavioural challenges, autism and related disorders.

Education Assistants work closely with students, assisting them with course content, preparing specialized teaching materials, and maintaining progress records. This program includes both theoretical studies and practical applications in areas such as understanding school curriculum, and developing strong observation and related skills.

Graduates are well prepared to facilitate and support the learning and independence of children who require extra assistance in meeting their educational goals. A 120- hour practicum is included.

Gateway Program

The Gateway Program is a partnership between Central Okanagan Public Schools and Okanagan College. For students in general, the pursuit of graduation and the transition to post-secondary education can often be difficult. For vulnerable students who deal with a myriad of obstacles, this transition can seem insurmountable. The Gateway Program strives to provide vulnerable students with the necessary supports to successfully transition to college and ultimately sustainable careers in the trade sector.

The Gateway initiative encompasses three progressive stages. As students move from stage one to three, the demands of the program increase. Therefore, the aim of each stage is to help students acquire the necessary skills to be successful at the next level. Students begin by taking a 5 week Pre-Gateway Program at Central School. Pre-Gateway focuses on readiness skills, including:

- · Self-discovery
- · Self esteem
- Team building
- Social growth (cooperation and bonding with fellow students)
- Character building (giving back to the community)
- Inner strength
- Tolerance and compassion for others
- Resiliency

Those Students who are successful in completing the Pre-Gateway Program move on to stage two (Gateway), attending Okanagan College for an extended 10 week period where they explore a variety of trades including: carpentry and joinery, plumbing, electrical, welding, automotive, metal work, collision repair and culinary arts. Stage two also includes a 5-day co-op work experience component where students are able to gain valuable on the job work experience in addition to networking with potential employers.

In stage three, students select a specific trade and enter the Dual Credit Foundation Studies Program for an extended 20-40 weeks, depending on the trade selection.

Vulnerable youth require a tremendous support network if they are to be successful transitioning to college life. The support staff at Central Programs and Services, including learning assistance teachers, resource teachers and counselors, work closely with their colleagues at Okanagan College to ensure that required learning adaptations and mental health supports are in place for our students.

Over the past four years, we have seen increasing success with students enrolling in the Gateway Program with more students accessing a dual credit apprenticeship course and completing their foundation year in a variety of trade areas. 2017 will be the first year that Gateway has teamed up with YMCA and their jump start program for students to access specific training for employment within the community. Our hope is that students who do not pursue a college apprenticeship at this time will continue developing skills through the YMCA to secure sustainable employment.

Why join the Chess Club? or complexity of the

chess. Central Okanagan Public Schools is providing more and more opportunities for students to play chess at school. A network of local teachers and parents have banned together to support school Chess KLO Middle school will host a fun first chess tournament for beginners Saturday, January 21, 2017. Later, Mount Boucherie Secondary is hosting a Beginners Luck tournament Saturday, February 18, 2017.

Since 2004, the District has hosted an annual District chess championship. These events are for students in grades one to twelve. I am fascinated with the patience and sustained desire young students have to learn the game. At times, students will coordinate their pawns gradually toward the centre in symmetrical patterns without a single capture anticipating what might happen

Children with weak executive function focus their attention or control their behavior. For many, the chess club is a fun social event to build strong friendships. Chess also develops the skills to plan many moves in advance and necessitates the successful use of problem solving, planning, and reasoning skills. For younger children, who may lose patience with the pace

game, teachers have devised simplifications such as a minigames with only pawns or attempting Children have endless fun exploring to checkmate a King with only two multiple and emerging worlds within rooks. This can quicken the pace of learning. For kids who already know the rules and tend to be inflexible in their thinking, playing pieces in isolation can help them adapt to the concept of change.

Dr. Bill Hudenko, Child Psychologist Clubs and host chess tournaments. and Assistant Professor of Psychiatry at Dartmouth's Geisel School of Medicine, uses board games in his practice to help him diagnose and to strengthen the executive function area of the brain. Hudenko adds, "Chess requires kids to attend to multiple emerging scenarios as they evolve on the board. Advanced players learn to think many moves ahead. Playing chess makes it necessary to use problem solving, planning, and reasoning skills that are the hallmark of healthy executive functioning. Chess can also provide a stage for teaching impulsive kids how to slow down and think carefully before acting in a way that leads to the loss of a piece."

Chess is, paradoxically, a simple face numerous challenges in school to and a complex game. Board games are educational tools for parents in





"We are looking forward to bringing the ideas that we learned at the conference to our school!"







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SCHOLARSHIPS AND BURSARIES

Provincial Scholarships Program

BASIC ELIGIBILITY REQUIREMENT

To be eligible for the Provincial Scholarships Program, recipients:

- Must be a Canadian citizen or permanent resident (landed immigrant) at the time of registration in the school year for which the scholarship is awarded;
- Must be a BC resident;
- Must be (or have been at the time of receipt) enrolled in, or registered as a home schooler with:
 - British Columbia public school (including Distance Learning schools), or
 - Group 1, 2, or 4 British Columbia Independent School, or
 - Continuing Education Centre.

BC ACHIEVEMENT SCHOLARSHIP

Shade BC Achievement Scholarships Information and Secondary School Apprenticeship (SSA) information.

This scholarship recognizes the top 8000 graduates in BC. The Ministry determines the recipients based on achievement in Grades 10, 11 & 12 courses that satisfy 2004 Graduation Program requirements, including elective courses. Grad Transitions is not included.

Qualifying for a BC Achievement Scholarship

A student will receive a \$1250 scholarship voucher if the student:

- Meets basic eligibility requirements, and
- Fulfills B.C. graduation requirements of the 2004 Graduation Program by August 31, 2017, and
- Has at least a "B" (73% or above) or better grade in their Language Arts 12 course, and
- Writes and passes a Language Arts 12 provincial examination, and
- Has no more than one TS (Transfer Standing) or SG (Standing Granted) indicator among course marks used for the calculation of winners, excluding Language Arts 12, which must have a percentage score.

DISTRICT / AUTHORITY SCHOLARSHIPS

Qualifying for a District/Authority Scholarship

To win a \$1250 scholarship, a student must apply and:

- Meet basic eligibility requirements
- Meet criteria determined by the local scholarship committee, which requires a student to demonstrate outstanding achievement in any of the following areas:
 - Indigenous Languages and Culture, demonstrated at school or in the community
 - Fine Arts (e.g., Visual Arts, Dance, Drama, Music)
 - Applied Skills (e.g., Business Ed, Technology Ed, Home Economics)
 - **Physical Activity** (e.g., Athletics, Dance, Gymnastics, not limited to Physical Education)
 - International Languages with Integrated Resource Packages (IRPs) or External Assessments, including A.P. and I.B. courses
 - Community Service (Volunteer Activity), which includes demonstration of local and global issues and cultural awareness
 - **Technical and Trades Training** (e.g., Carpentry, Automotive, Mechanics, Cook Training)
- Fulfill the B.C. graduation requirements of either the 2004 Graduation Program or the Adult Graduation Program by August 31st of the student's graduating year.
- the Adult Graduation Program by August 31st of the student's graduating year

 Have not previously received a District/Authority Award or a District/Authority Scholarship

Local scholarship committee criteria must ensure that winners have been cumulatively evaluated in the area of achievement chosen for presentation to the committee, and satisfy other criteria which may include factors such as attendance, punctuality, work habits and cooperation.




\$1000 Scholarship Criteria

Students who are eligible for the Secondary School Apprenticeship scholarship will automatically be considered for the award.

To be eligible, an Industry Training Authority (ITA)-registered youth apprentice must have:

- Been registered in a school district Secondary School Apprenticeship Program prior to graduation
- Graduated with a Grade 12 Dogwood Diploma or Adult Dogwood
- Successfully completed SSA 11A, SSA 11B, SSA 12A, and SSA 12B
- Maintained a C+ average or better on Grade 12 numbered courses
- Reported a total of at least 900 hours to the ITA within six months of graduation







HOW TO APPLY ONLINE

In your web browser type: https://enrollment.sd23.bc.ca No internet access? Go directly to a school on February 6th or later to complete the on-line application. Assistance will be provided. Applications will be assigned a date-time stamp on a first-come, first-served basis, which will factor into a student's placement priority.

Complete the on-line application as early as possible, and provide the required documents listed below directly to the school either in person or by email by Friday, March 10, 2017.

- 1. Birth certificate or other government issued proof of age and citizenship
- 2. Proof of B.C. Residency
 - a. BC driver's license of parent/legal guardian AND
 - b. BC CARE card of parent/legal guardian OR
 - c. Other supporting documentation www.sd23.bc.ca/DistrictInfo/schoolenrollment/
- 3. Proof of Student's Living Address
 - a. Property ownership, lease or rental agreement



AFTER March 10, 2017

New in-catchment area enrollments: Parents will be notified by a confirmation email when the school has accepted the student's application for enrollment. Board Policy 405R - Student Placement (Regulations), will be used to determine student placement and priority.

New out-of-catchment area enrollments: Parents may not be notified until after the summer enrollment period (August 29-31, 2017) is over and all incatchment area students have been placed.

Where do I find the link to register online?

Go to any District school site and click on the Student Enrollment Information link. Student Enrollment Information OR type https://enrollment.sd23.bc.ca into your browser. We recommend that

you use Google Chrome or Mozilla Firefox. We do not recommend that you try to complete an application on an iPhone or tablet.

How do I know what school I should choose?

You can find out what your catchment school is by entering your address into the Catchment School Locator. Catchment Area School Locator Find this link on any school homepage under Quick Links near the bottom of the page.

This will give you a list of schools which are your catchment schools for elementary, middle and secondary. You may have several elementary schools to choose from or only one depending on the area you live. You will need to provide a 1st and 2nd choice.



What if I would like to choose a school which is not my catchment school?

The District does allow parents to apply to schools outside of their catchment area but there are a few things to consider. Catchment area students will receive priority according to District policy. Available spaces may be given to an out of catchment student; however, these spaces will only be given out after the Summer Enrollment Application Period (August 29-31, 2017). This means you may not know if you will have a space for your child in the out of catchment school until the first week of school in September. It is recommended that if you choose an out of catchment school as your first choice that your 2nd or 3rd choice be your catchment area school.

I already have a child in the school, do I still need to register my younger child for Kindergarten?

Yes, don't forget to do this. Priority will be given to students with siblings in the school; however, if you do not register during the early registration period, you may

When will I know if my child has been accepted to my first choice school?

If your first choice school is your catchment area school, you should find out in April 2017 if your child has been accepted or if they have been placed on a waiting list.

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Dual Credit Programs & Registration Information

WHAT IS DUAL CREDIT?

Dual credit opportunities are available to all secondary school students in the District. These options allow students access to post-secondary training while still in high school. Credits are earned in both the secondary and postsecondary systems.

WHEN CAN I START?

PARTIAL & FULL SCHOLARSHIPS AVAILABLE FOR ALL PROGAMS:

Students can apply to these programs in grade 10 or 11 and start course work in grade 11 or 12 (depending on the program). Students can begin their trades training program in grade 12 year. Secondary School Apprenticeship (SSA) programs can begin as late as May of grade 12 as long as they are school aged as required by the Ministry of Education. In all cases, dual credit students must be school aged as per the Ministry of Education in order to receive tuition funding for post-secondary trades training.

HOW TO APPLY for these programs and receive tuition scholarship:

- 1. Contact the Career/Life Programs Coordinator at your school and pick up an application package.
- 2. Complete the District Dual Credit Application Package and hand it in at your school's Career Center.
- 3. A successful interview with a Dual Credit Coordinator.
- 4. Once you are accepted into the program, you must pay a deposit to hold your spot [\$200(x2) for OC or \$250 for BCIT].

The Canadian Sport School - A **Multi-Sport Training & Learning Environment**

The Canadian Sport School program, delivered in collaboration with Central Okanagan Public Schools and PacificSport Okanagan, is designed to support student-athletes who strive to find daily balance through their pursuit of excellence in the classroom, in their sport and in the community. The program helps alleviate the pressures experienced by student-athletes and ensures that they have the skills and resources needed to continue to progress and excel.

Student-athletes are able to bring their physical training into the school day by participating in a half day multi-sport training program with PacificSport Okanagan coaching specialists. The training program delivers the IGNITE Athlete Development Program which focuses on athleticism and new skill development through strength training, sprint training, yoga and basic gymnastics movements.

A dedicated School District teacher is on staff at the program to teach and to assist student-athletes with their academic studies as required. When finished with training, studentathletes are transported to their respective public school for half the day with their existing teachers, friends, and peers for the remainder of their educational requirements. The majority of the BC graduation program required courses are delivered through the studentathlete's school of record. The remainder of their elective courses will be offered by the Canadian Sport School via distributed learning. Some of the elective courses blend learning and training and include Human Performance, Athlete Training, Sports Marketing, High Performance PE, and Individual Sports Training.

BC School Sports

Vice-Principal - École Kelowna Secondary School

BC School Sports is the governing body of all school sports programs in the province of British Columbia.

There are regulations over who may be eligible to play in an organized sport at their respective schools and the following 5 general rules for eligibility apply;

- 1. Student-athletes can only compete for the school at which they are registered.
- 2. There is a maximum age allowed for each level of competition.
- 3. Student-athletes are athletically eligible for five years, from entry into Grade 8.
- 4. Student-athletes cannot have graduated from secondary school.
- 5. Student-athletes must be full-time.

There are also specific rules around transferring schools during an athletes ive year eligibility window.

A transfer of schools after the start of the first year of eligibility may limit athletic eligibility at the new school. All student-athletes who transfer schools after the first year of eligibility must have their Athletic Director determine the student-athlete's eligibility based on BCSS Competitive Rules and Regulations.... In support of the goal of equitable competition, student athletes are eligible for the school at which they are registered on the first day of their 2nd year of eligibility: this is a student-athlete's "home school." Any transfer to another school after that day may affect athletic eligibility at the new school for a 12 month period.

Please be sure to check with your school's Athletic Director for more nformation around eligibility rules and regulations from BC School Sports.




Throughout the last ten years, Harmony Day has grown exponentially. Starting off small with about half of our

Babysitter Training

Ages 10+ (\$60)

Kelowna: Feb. 24, March 21 & 29, May 19, July 10 & 24, Aug. 16 & 24 West Kelowna: Jan. 28, March 22, July 25 & Aug. 14

This 1 day, 6.5 hr course provides students with the knowledge to care for children ages infant to eight years old.

<u>Home Alone</u>



Young-Parent Program

The Young-Parent Program is a safe place for students to learn and socialize with other students. It helps to connect these students to the school. The students' babies are very near so they can be mentored after class discussions or presentations, allowing the students to apply what they have learned to their babies. For example, the young parents learn how to actively read with their babies, using stimulation through rhyming and pictures, and then immediately put it into practice.

The program also helps to connect the young parents to their community. After high-school, a career is important. The program constantly has guest speakers in to help with the students' future goals. There have been connections with WorkBC, motivational tools and speakers, as well as job shadows. There is also certificate qualifications for our young parents; Food Safe Level One, Basic First Aid, Drivers Learning permits (L & N).

The Young-Parent Program has a coordinator that arranges services between childcare service, mothers and the school system, case




management referrals, connecting mothers with communities and supporting child development education.

Having a liaison between the young parent and teachers is important. Times when the baby is sick allows for better communication between teacher and student for providing time to make up missed work.


Parenting skills are also taught within the program. The parents learn the following strategies:

- Discipline vs. punishment
- Milestones for baby
- Linguistics
- Importance of reading, rhyming and song
- Sleep training
- Potty training
- Connection
- · Breast feeding
- Fine and gross motor skill exercises

The role of a Young-Parent Program teacher is different than a regular classroom. Young mothers have many responsibilities. Getting to school is tough. Having enough nutritious food in a day can be an issue; therefore, providing a warm pot of soup, or healthy smoothie can go a long way towards changing a day for these students. The teacher takes on the role of a life coach and keeps our young parents connected to their school.







and care provided to each of our many




